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Campus Election Engagement Project ~ *State Director* (2012 - present Virginia; 2008 Colorado)

Designed curriculum with on-line modules for multi-disciplinary, faculty use to advance student electoral education and engagement in elections. Brought together a dozen colleges and universities in educational partnerships to serve local election offices and increase capacity. Partnered with national civic organizations, the State Board of Elections on-line curriculum, as well as the League of Women Voters in outreach and program implementation. Awarded external funding for this engaged curriculum from the Rapoport Foundation (\$50,000) and Help Americans Vote Act (\$75,000). We funded campus development of social media campaigns using Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Polldaddy, and websites to advance student engagement and electoral education. Used Moodle (2008) and Weebly (2013).

University of Michigan ~ *Ginsberg Center Director* (2009 – 2011)

Faculty Development: Launched a campus-wide faculty cohort among the 19 schools and colleges within the University to advance community-based research, engaged scholarship, service-learning, and experiential education teaching pedagogies. We supported strategic educational outreach to more diverse partnerships in Detroit. We built upon faculty interest in social entrepreneurship and a Detroit Community-Based Research Corridor. We convened and sponsored faculty seminars, colloquia, and research initiatives, as a part of the John Dewey Lecture Series to advance the practice and scholarship of engaged teaching. These programs allowed faculty to discuss "best practices" and to learn about new pedagogical strategies, and technologies to enhance their role as scholars and educators and, in turn, facilitate a culture of engaged learning and applied scholarship. We focused our outreach on underserved populations by supporting the graduate student bi-annual colloquium sponsored by the Center for the Education of Women.

Promoting Best Practices through Partnerships: We built upon the university's Wallenberg human rights award winner's work through the creation of a student immersion Maymester experience in Mexico. This international partnership between undergraduate students and Lydia Cacho's non-profit, Ciam Cancun, served to advance women's rights and the quality of life in Mexico. We also fostered partnerships to finance graduate internships working in the field to advance faculty research. With significant investments from the Michigan Commission for Community Service, together we supported the largest university community-based learning program enabling students to do field work in Detroit. Partnered with the U of M's Center for Research on Learning and Teaching.

Program Planning & Assessment: I worked with the Assistant Dean for Undergraduate Education charged with Curriculum and the School of Education's Director of Outreach, as well as faculty, and senior staff to develop programming for the Center and to chart the future. Working with 17 staff members, we developed assessment plans and annual performance reports for our unit. As a staff team, we instituted a professional learning community culture for staff development and peer led staff meetings. Initiated program reviews for the Center with the goals of integrating program areas to enhance efficiencies, better articulate learning outcomes and more specifically quantify impacts.

Technology: I initiated competitive bids to re-create the web site to increase its user friendliness using WordPress. I also updated the Center's website within this new wireframe. We promoted the use of shared faculty and community databases. We created on-line branding campaigns including a video tribute, and a FaceBook page with a blog.

Pedagogical Leadership: Served as the campus representative for The Research University Civic Engagement Network. Participation in this professional network allowed our Engaged Practitioners to stay current with innovations in pedagogy and the most recent research. I've worked closely with the top national Engaged Scholars.

Develop & Manage Center Budget: I managed seventeen staff, a \$1.5 M budget and all sponsored contracts.

Colorado Campus Compact (CCC), Executive Director (2000 – 2009)

Faculty Development: Working with faculty at more than 60 campuses regionally, I designed and convened the Chief Academic Officers' and Engaged Scholarship Institutes, both regional and campus syllabi workshops with national expert, Dr. Kerri Heffernan. I trained campuses in the Engaged Department model based on Ernest Boyer's work. I worked with Department Chair's to customize workshops based on campus needs and academic discipline. I

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created the Western Engaged Scholars Program with particular relevance to South West culture. Individually coached faculty.

Promoting Best Practices Through Partnerships: In response to our region's low rate of college access, I initiated partnerships with six states, 200 community partners, and co-created a volunteer infrastructure of 52 Coordinators. In our efforts to improve student retention and student voice, we created higher education partnerships with at-risk youth using a variety of civic curricular strategies drawn from Public Achievement, Teaching Tolerance, and Peace Jam. As a member of the CO planning team, we funded the 1st civic Living Learning residential model with CO Springs schools.

Program Planning and Assessment: Based on stakeholder feedback, and national data pointing to Colorado's low rate of investment in college access and success, I redesigned a small federal program into a six state partnership. UCAN Serve became the largest college access and affordability program of its kind (2004-09). We then extended this effort into high schools by designing a state-wide VISTA program to support partnerships with college campuses that were focused on increasing access. To empower staff, I implemented 360 degree feedback method for assessment.

Technology: Frustrated by the limitations of institutional servers, we created our own on-line interactive databases and secured an independent server to improve accessibility and ease of information exchange. We moved our grantees to on-line reporting, paperless filing and quarterly conference calls with topical webinars as needed.

Pedagogical Leadership: We replicated national Engaged Scholarship models funded by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Ford Foundation. Recognizing our unique culture, we articulated the South West approach to civic engagement based on Mitch Thomashaw's work. I nurtured the concept of Indigenous Engagement, highlighting local leadership approaches in Native communities, relying upon Ruby Payne's *Bridges Out of Poverty*. Advanced the *Asset Based Community Development* model developed by John McKnight.

Develop and Manage Compact Budget: Redistributed Compact resources from the wealthiest 8 Front Range campuses to Colorado's lowest income counties. Managed over a \$1 M budget with an additional \$5.5 million in student scholarships. I hired, trained, supervised and evaluated 10 staff, 20 regional grantees during my tenure.

Teaching: Served as a faculty member for the First Year Experience course which I helped re-write with the Chair of the English Department to focus the learning outcomes on developing critical analysis and communication skills. Designed and led immersion courses advancing cultural competencies. Taught O.C.T.A.A. alcohol awareness program.

Faculty Development: Contributed to the faculty orientation program where we provided a city tour through Milwaukee showcasing the economic and social challenges. Recruited and trained faculty to serve as new student orientation advisors and mentors throughout the First Year Experience, a curriculum I helped re-write.

Promoting Best Practices Through Partnerships: Developed curriculum for cultural immersion. Developed a community advisory board including local liquor stores, bars and local law enforcement agencies to assist our campus with its goals of decreasing alcohol infractions. Served on the Conditional Acceptance Program committee to support at-risk students. Served on the Gay, Lesbian, Bi-Sexual Task Force to promote tolerance building campus policies.

Program Planning and Assessment: As a result of national rankings, confirmed by state campus data, we launched a campus educational campaign focused on alcohol awareness with the goal of reducing campus infractions involving alcohol related incidents. By restructuring our new student orientation programs, educating Residential Life staff and creating alternative opportunities for student engagement through the First Year experience, we were able to decrease student alcohol infractions. Initiated the first student, Living Learning community focused on health and wellness.

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Pedagogical Leadership: Advanced student development goals of health and wellness. I supported a successful FIPSE grant application to initiate this cultural paradigm shift away from student drinking toward healthier opportunities for student engagement. Sponsored Wisconsin leadership conference, presented to all 30 campuses.

Develop and Manage Budget: Assisted in organizing biannual Student Development staff training, residential life and student life trainings. Nominated to and participated in the campus, Five Year Strategic Plan development team. Trained, supervised and evaluated fifteen person, professional and student staff annually.

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EQUITY and SOCIAL JUSTICE

School of the Americas Watch ~ *Prisoner of Conscience* (Nov. 2011 and Nov. 2008)

As an engaged civic educator, I tested my dedication to human rights principles and my personal ethics by participating in a non-violent protest. This annual educational event hosted at the gates of Fort Benning in Georgia focuses international attention on U.S. investments in torture education. I was charged with a misdemeanor for trespass for my nonviolent civil disobedience. My eight months of sentences allowed me insight into the justice and health issues facing incarcerated women throughout the justice system.

As an intern under visionary Jeremy Rifkin and his education reform Partnership Initiative for a Civil Society and Democratic Education, we identified cutting edge practitioners across the country and united them in a national coalition to advance funding. Identified national models where students' voices were at the center of educational decision making and governance. We connected often isolated practitioners in education reform to visit with one another and learn about each other's models through site visits and professional exchanges.

As a student leader at a law school known for its public interest work, I raised funds for student fellowships to enable them to act upon their vision for social responsibility within the public interest legal field.

As a legal intern for the Office of Post-Secondary Education, I assisted the legal counsel with drafting reauthorization recommendations for the Americans with Disabilities Act by collecting data from the general public and integrating recommendations into proposed statutory language.

The Institute compiled local studies of the greater Buffalo area within the context of the body of research concerning Western New York growth trends, as well as other comparable regions. These cities and their populations were declining, while their model for government was not changing. I assisted the Institute with its efforts to advance shared regional, municipal and county governing. We hosted regional dialogues and advanced Benchmarks based on national models to assess regional health. By disseminating local studies that supported national research findings, we were able to assist local governments in rethinking service delivery.

I supported sweeping immigration policy reforms advanced to the various House and Senate subcommittees by the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops. While working for the Office of Government Liaison, I worked in partnership with Catholic Relief Services on coalition building in support of political prisoners, religious workers' visas, refugees and immigrants, especially Haitian relief. As a legal intern, I supported General Counsel in advancing disability services within Catholic schools through new legislation and reauthorization.

As a graduate intern, I worked for the largest TRIO program in the state of New York under Dr. Henry Durand. We assisted first-generation college and low income students in realizing their dream of graduating from college.
